#### COVID-19 Stimulus Relief Package

- \$1.9 trillion COVID-19 stimulus relief package
- Signed into law March 11, 2021
- \$350 billion in direct aid to state and local governments
- Additional funding for other areas:
  - Education
  - Rental Assistance
  - Transit
  - Public Health
  - Small Business and Nonprofits
  - Economic Development
  - Libraries

## The state & local portion of the funding is \$350 billion

- State and District of Columbia funding \$195.3 billion
- Funding divided between cities and counties \$130 billion
  - Cities \$45.5 billion allocated to metro cities over 50k population utilizing modified CDBG formula, remaining ~ \$20 billion to smaller jurisdictions
  - Counties \$65 billion allocated based on population
  - U.S. Treasury required to pay first tranche to states, counties, and cities no later than 60-days after enactment (portal opened May 10), and second payment no earlier than 12 months after first payment
  - All fiscal recovery funds will remain available until December 31, 2024. By this date the funds must be obligated to a program or project. All funds must be spent by December 31, 2026.

## The state & local portion of the funding is \$350 billion

- Community Development: \$10 billion in Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund
  - Anticipate guidelines from Treasury soon
  - Each state will receive a \$100 million minimum payment
  - For "critical capital projects directly enabling work, education, and health monitoring, including remote options, in response to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease" including broadband infrastructure
  - States will administer funds

### City of Pflugerville Funding & Uses

- City of Pflugerville direct allocation \$6.1 million
- Eligible Uses of Fiscal Recovery Funding
  - Response to Public Health Emergency In response to the negative economic impacts from COVID-19 assistance:
    - Households
    - Small businesses
    - Nonprofits
    - Aid to impacted industries: tourism, travel, and hospitality
  - Essential Workers Premium Pay premium pay up to \$13/hr or \$25,000 per worker
  - Reduction of Revenue replenish lost revenue as a result of public health emergency
  - Investment in Infrastructure make any necessary investments in water, wastewater, or broadband infrastructure

### City of Pflugerville Funding & Uses

- Ineligible Uses of Fiscal Recovery Funding
  - May not be used to offset a reduction in the net tax revenue
  - May not be deposited into any pension fund
  - Cannot be used as a match to federal programs

## **Competitive Funding Opportunities**

- Capital Improvement Program Funding:
  - Infrastructure for clean water and wastewater
  - Technology to support remote work
  - Enhance cybersecurity
- Library and Public Safety Grants

## Eligible Project Request

#### **General Fund**

- ERP System- \$6M
- Payment Kiosk- \$500,000
- E-Permitting- \$455, 000
- Upgrades to Firewalls, Routers, Switches, and Access Points-\$250,000
- Fiber Ring completion- \$2M
- VOIP system upgrade- \$131,000

## Eligible Project Request

#### **Utility Fund**

- Elevated Storage Tank \$18.3M
- Water Treatment Plant \$99.5M
- Water Meter Conversion- \$4M
- Colorado Sand Drive- \$1.03M
- Water Lines- \$32.8M
- Wastewater Treatment Plants- \$133M
- Wastewater Interceptor- \$33M

#### Coronavirus Relief Funds

- Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) under the CARES Act was signed into law on March 27,2020 for a total \$2 trillion economic relief package.
- City of Pflugerville received \$3.5 million through Travis County interlocal
  - Economic Support Grants: \$1.2M
  - Public Health Expenses \$192K
  - Payroll COVID-19 Response: \$1.7M
  - COVID-19 Public Health Compliance: \$371K

#### Lessons Learned - CRF vs ARPA

- In 2020, the Treasury Department issued guidance on the use of CRF funds late in the process and then issued revisions that impacted program design and post-expenditure reporting requirements.
- ARPA provides more time to determine how to best utilize the funds.
  - The City of Pflugerville may be liable for repayment of expenditures that are deemed ineligible for one-time ARPA funds.

#### **Tentative Scenarios**

- Hold the allocated funding as we pursue competitive grants (recommended)
- Allocate to General Fund projects and continue to pursue competitive grants
- Allocate to Utility Fund projects and continue to pursue competitive grants

#### What We Know

- Reporting requirements have not been finalized
- Clarification on allowable use guidance is being requested by governments nationwide
- Official award amounts for grants in each state has not been issued
- Guidance on the competitive grants is still being developed
  - The Treasury Department will open the portal to apply for these additional funds this summer
