According to the 2015 State of America's Libraries Report by the American Library Association (ALA), the perception of academic, public and school libraries is shifting in their communities and in society. "No longer just places for books, libraries of all types are viewed as anchors, centers for academic life and research and cherished spaces." – American Library Association, 2015.


The Pflugerville Library is more than a school or job resources center, it is more than stacks of books or new tech toys, it is more than movies or a business luncheon or a place to study, it is more than book clubs or quilting groups or a place to volunteer, it is more than story time or a place to dream- it is *all* of these and more; it's the community living room.

April 2015 marked the second year of the opening of the expanded Pflugerville Public Library. In 2015, the Library hosted 236,000 visitors in person and more than 134,000 online. Almost 360,000 in physical items were checked out and 31,000 in e-resources. The physical collection increased from 66,000 items to over 68,000 with a total collection value of physical items totaling more than \$1.4 million. The Library put on approximately 1,000 programs for about 20,000 attendees and the meeting rooms logged more than 2500 reserved hours. Even more tellingly, the Library received 4,000 hours of volunteer help.


The library continues to preserve local history through the Pflugerville Digital History Project launched in 2014. In partnership with the Heritage House Museum Partners, the Pflugerville History Diggers, the Friends of the Pflugerville Library and the City of Pflugerville, the project digitizes documents, photographs, newspapers and ephemera from the early families of Pflugerville. Recently, the library has begun digitizing excerpts from the City's oral history project, documenting life in Pflugerville from 1965 to the present. To date over 2000 items have been digitally preserved.

The Pflugerville Public Library is constantly seeking to provide services for all people at every stage of their lives. This involves providing materials in a huge number of formats and practices ranging across technology and services and encompasses everything from homebound delivery to e-books, craft programs to audiobooks in Vietnamese, story time to computer classes. The Digital Inclusion Survey conducted by the University of Maryland and the American Library Association, found that libraries address disparities in access to technology providing free broadband, public access technologies, digital content, digital literacy learning opportunities, and a range of programming that helps build digitally inclusive communities regardless of geographic location, socioeconomic status, or any other factor – American Library Association, 2015





The library relies heavily on its volunteers to provide support for library programs and patron services. Volunteer hours totaled 4,439 and volunteers served the community during story time, adult craft, as greeters and


circulation back-ups. We could not do without their support!



Program attendance held steady this year. The total number of programs provided in FY2015 was 1,018 with an attendance of almost 20,000. In 2015, library introduced programs specifically for seniors including Senior Crafternoon and Senior Appy Hour and all ages programs focused on specifically on technology and crafts such as MakerPfest.

Computer classes for adults served 265. The Conversational ESL Club provides a place for those who want to practice their English pronunciation in a non-judgmental environment.

Story times attracted 1,161 for baby time 1,082 for bilingual and overall story time programs there were over 6,500 attendees.






Tomorrow: 2017 & 2018


The Library is a success on many levels. It meets the highest standards of TSLAC accreditation- with the exception of collection size. To address this issue within the confines of the physical space, the Library devotes a significant portion of the collection budget to space saving e-resources. These include streaming movies and music, e-books, e-magazines, and e-audiobooks as well as several dozen databases. These resources are evaluated by library staff for usability. As options increase, the library e-resources are re-evaluated




in comparison to competitors and changes are made accordingly.








Currently, the Pflugerville Library provides access to approximately 10,000 contemporary e-books with another 46,000 classic e-books through Project Gutenberg. Further, the Library is in constant discussion with a wide-range of e-vendors, looking for the most accessible and efficient new e-resources. Librarians attend conferences and workshops and participate in continuing education to stay abreast of emerging technologies, services and resources in the field. Last year, staff logged more than 270 hours of continuing education.


While the Library is expanding its digital collection as fast as possible, not everything is available in an electronic format. Further, not every one of our residents is equipped to take advantage of the Library's digital offerings. Print, as one of a multitude of options, will be around for some time to come.

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The Library's current collection physical collection hovers around the 68,000 item mark. While our collection is fresh, new, and much in demand, every item must earn its place on the shelves. As of 2014, Georgetown, with a similarly sized service population, maintains a collection of approximately 110,000 items in a 49,500 sq.ft. building. Round Rock, with a population of just over 100,000 people, has a collection in excess of 200,000 items.

Round Rock Public Library recently conducted a third-party study that concluded it needed not one new library but two. The supporting \$23 million bond passed in 2013. Pflugerville City Planning indicates the Pflugerville population will reach 61,000 by 2019.

Pflugerville will need a new main library of 45,000-50,000 sq. ft., with associated parking adequate for programming, complete and open by 2022.

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Appendix: Yesterday

Yesterday

The Pflugerville Community Library was established in 1982 through the efforts of the Friends of the Pflugerville Community Library, who organized in 1981 and opened a one-room storefront library in downtown Pflugerville. In 1985, the City supplied some funds for operation and provided a small house at 102 South Third Street at nominal rent where the Library remained until 1999. The Library was gifted to the City by the Friends in 1992. By 1999, the Friends had also gifted land for a new library at 102 Tenth Street,

and, with the passage of a 1996 bond issue, the Library's new 12,500 facility was up and running.

Pflugerville's rapid growth from 16,335 residents in 2000 to 46,936 in 2010, an increase of 187%, occasioned another Library facility bond issue in 2008. With the approval of the \$7 million bond, the City commissioned architectural firms Vitetta and Piwonka-Sturrock and contractor Lee Lewis to renovate and expand the facility. Groundbreaking was held in January 2012, construction was substantially complete in April, 2013, and the Library hosted a well-attended Grand Opening on June 8th, 2013.

A new building brought a new name, the Pflugerville Public Library, and almost 150,000 new visitors. In fiscal year 2014, the Library welcomed almost 345,000 people through its doors, plus another 100,000 online.

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
