- 74. Kevin Lucas Park 8th grade, Pflugerville classmate Kevin received a heart transplant.between our freshman and sophomore year at PHS, Kevin suffered a heart attack and died. I would love to see his memory honored by naming a park after him. Families still live in community.

- 81. Cesar Chavez Community Park- Cesar Chavez was a community figure who believed in equality and unity for all people. He has yet to be recognized as he should be for his sacrifices and contributions he has made to our society to provide a better life for all. Thank you for your consideration and time.

- 83. Scott Winton Park Former Mayor Scott Winton Park before his many contributions fade from civic memory. As chair of the Parks and Recreations Commission in the late 1980s and mayor from 1988 to 1992, Scott was the guiding genius behind the first City hike-and-bike trail, the acquisition of Gilleland Creek Park and the construction of the City's first public pool. Before the hike-and-bike trail, Pflugerville was a spotty collection of neighborhoods - Old Town, Gatlinburg, Willow Creek, Brookhollow. The hike-and-bike trail stitched the City together so that it was poised for the remarkable growth at the end of the 20th Century. Scott had his faults, but it was his vision that was the foundation of our current park system.
- 84. Cesar Chavez Park noted civil rights advocate; doing so would honor the individual and what he stood for, as well as recognize and celebrate the diversity of our growing city.
- 85. Charles and Vernagene Mott Park Having been active in the Pflugerville community for the last 15 years, I can't think of anyone else who was a big part of Pflugerville "way back when" and still is! Charles and Vernagene Mott Stadium or Charles and Vernagene Mott Park.
- 86. Square Roberts Park In the early twentieth century, African American workers in the Pflugerville Cotton Industry were not allowed to buy property in town. In 1910, La Rue Noton, a farmer who owned around 1,200 acres west of Pflugerville, set aside an acre and sold lots to the workers for fifty dollars each. The settlement was recorded in county records as the Colored Addition to Pflugerville. In 1909, Reverend Square Roberts held church services under a brush arbor on the Fritz Pfluger Farm in the Colored Addition to Pflugerville subdivision. A few months later, services were held in the schoolhouse. In January 1910, under Reverend Roberts' leadership, a Baptist church was organized.
- 87. Russell Park One of the only families still living in the Colored Addition (to Pflugerville subdivision).
- John Liese Park or Johann Ludwig Liese Sports Complex I suggest the new park be named for John Liese. He came to Texas in the early 1830's and fought in the war for independence. He received for his service bounty warrant 1006 for 960 acres on December 18, 1837. It was patented to him October 15, 1845. (Patent 8, volume 3, abstract 496 General Land Office; Bounty #18 Travis County Vol B, page 90.). On January 29, 1853, Henry Pfluger purchased the 960 acres from Liese, his first wife's brother. Henry's first wife died in Germany in 1844. Liese returned to Germany where he died May 6, 1870.
