

## **Capital Area Council of Governments Clean Air Coalition**

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July 5, 2017

Dear Central Texas Clean Air Coalition Member Jurisdictions,

The regional air quality program at the Capital Area Council of Governments (CAPCOG) is in jeopardy as a result of the Governor's line-item veto of the 2018-2019 "near nonattainment" area grant funding in the state budget. Central Texas has relied on this state funding for the past twenty years to support our successful and nationally acclaimed regional air quality planning efforts. As the officers of CAPCOG's Central Texas Clean Air Coalition (CAC), we are now asking the local governments that participate in the regional air quality planning effort help preserve this important program.

Continuing CAPCOG's air quality program through 2018 will be important to fulfill our region's commitments as part of our Ozone Advance Program Action Plan, to help ensure that the region remains in compliance with federal standards, and to help ensure that we don't lose irreplaceable air quality monitoring data. CAPCOG has already taken steps to try to preserve as much of the existing 2016-2017 state funding as possible, but financial support from Clean Air Coalition members is needed to avoid the most damaging cuts to the program. Additional funding is needed from CAC members to avoid an immediate loss of air monitoring data and a loss of some of CAPCOG's air quality planning, technical analysis, and outreach expertise starting on October 1, 2017, and the entire program after June 2018. Without CAPCOG's air quality program, our region would be solely dependent on the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on air quality issues and information.

At an emergency June 28<sup>th</sup> CAC meeting, the Clean Air Coalition representatives were unanimous in asking CAPCOG staff to submit budget requests to each CAC jurisdiction consistent with maintaining CAPCOG's current air quality monitoring network through the end of calendar year 2018 and maintaining staffing levels through the end of FY 2018 ("Tier 4" level of service on the enclosed proposal). This funding will be essential to successfully completing our regional air quality plan in 2018 and buys us time to figure out a long-term plan for our regional air quality planning efforts beyond 2018. The enclosed proposal helps us do that in a way that we think helps spread costs fairly among all CAC members. We ask that you provide a response to Andrew Hoekzema, CAPCOG's Director of Regional Services, at <a href="mailto:ahoekzema@capcog.org">ahoekzema@capcog.org</a> no later than July 24, 2017.
