

The 3rd Amendment to the 2015 Action Plan is due to the reallocation of funds due to final construction cost for the roadway projects funded through the Action Plan. No projects we changed only the amount allocated to each roadway.

Executive Summary

1. Introduction

In 2015, the initial Action Plan outlined projects for mobility infrastructure, parks and youth community services. Since becoming an entitlement grantee the City of Pflugerville has lost projects due to changes in the eligibility criteria or other circumstances. The Pflugerville community is fortunate that the majority of our citizens do not meet the requirements to qualify within the threshold of LMI and therefore within Pflugerville's jurisdiction there are very few block groups that exceed the 50% requirement. Pflugerville is considered an exception grantee, having received an exception to be able to undertake area benefit activities. Activities within the City of Pflugerville are considered to principally benefit low and moderate income persons when the area served by such activity is at 41.44 percent or higher; which is up 16.74% since the start of our program. Three block groups that are wholly or partially within our community meet this standard. Over the course of our program, projects have been lost projects due to changes in the eligibility criteria or other external circumstances.

The purpose of the 3rd amendment to the 2015 Action Plan is to reallocate grant funds to match align more closely with the engineers estimate and bid amounts for the construction of each of the proposed roadway projects once design was completed. The projects proposed focus primarily on infrastructure projects within the three identified block groups which were less likely to become ineligible and are coupled with funding from other program years in order to complete a series of infrastructure projects within the same block group.

The proposed projects include:

1. *Foothill Farms Loop Sidewalk Construction (completed \$18,781.88)*
2. *Youth Recreation Scholarship Program (completed \$5,862)*
3. *Gatlinburg Sidewalk Improvements (completed \$40,778.25)*
4. *Recreation Center Accessibility Improvements for Seniors (completed \$45,217.13)*
5. *Administrative Costs (completed \$986.25)*

6. **Mill Creek Roadway Improvements Design and Construction (\$102,285)**
7. **MODIFIED - Green Meadows Lane Roadway Improvements Design and Construction (\$8,520)**
8. **MODIFIED - El Malino Drive Roadway Improvements Design and Construction of related drainage improvements (\$25,408)**

(Projects 6-8 will be grouped to the extent possible for design and construction in order to complete the projects in the most fiscally responsible manner.)

- 1A. **Alternate – Frost Circle Design and Construction (up to \$107,000)**
- 2A. **Alternate – El Malino Roadway Improvements Design and Construction (up to \$79,766)**

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

Three national objectives serve as the overall framework for the use of CDBG funds. The goals are to provide decent housing, create a suitable living environment and expand economic opportunities, to principally benefit extremely low, low and moderate income individuals and families. Income categories are calculated on an annual basis by HUD. Extremely low income households have an income of 0-30% Area Median Income (AMI), low income households have an income of 30-50% AMI and moderate income is 50-80% AMI. All income levels being adjusted based on family size.

In addition, the program must meet one of the following outcomes: availability/accessibility, sustainability or affordability. In addition HUD has established a listing of Matrix Codes for projects funded with CDBG monies. These codes are prioritized at the local level based on the community needs assessment. Matrix Codes are categorized as either “high” or “low” priorities. Included in the amendment to the action plan, is a new park facility geared toward senior activities which will begin with design and parking in PY 2015 and sidewalk repairs and a new sidewalk system within the Gatlinburg Subdivision. These projects are in addition to the youth scholarship program, Foothill Farms sidewalk addition, and the Recreation Center accessibility improvements for the senior center. The amendment replaces the Parkway Drive park parkland acquisition and associated park improvement project. All projects fall under the “high priorities” established with the Amended Consolidated Plan.

The Pflugerville Consolidated Plan designates the following activities as “high” priorities:

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

Program Year 2015 is the City's second year for implementation of the CDBG program. Projects selected for the previous program year focused heavily on sidewalk infrastructure and park improvements. Due to the City's exception status projects were found to be at risk when new data was issued that reflected a change in the status of low to moderate income citizens within the area of the selected projects. The update to the data caused the City to lose one sidewalk project which had been allocated the majority of funds for the program year. Based on the City's limited experience with the program, Pflugerville has opted to focus more attention on projects within block groups that exceed that the minimum exception requirement of 41.4 percent in order to not place future projects at risk or projects that are focused on infrastructure improvements that benefit the community overall.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

The City of Pflugerville consulted with a variety of stakeholders in an effort to assess the housing and community development needs and priorities within the community. From these consultations and assessments the Action Plan was created and serves as the plan for projects annually that will be funded during the five year life of the Consolidated Plan 2014-2019.

In order to obtain input from public agencies and community organizations staff met with one of the primary service provider within the community, Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Affairs to discuss the needs they address and where the insufficiencies appear to be for the citizens they serve. These meetings were vital in developing an understanding of housing, employment, transportation and basic necessities within the community.

In the early spring of 2015 City Council appointed a Senior Advisory Task Force to aid the city in the evaluating the needs of senior citizens within the community. This task force provided information regarding infrastructure improvements necessary to provide for better access to public facilities, such as the Recreation/Senior Center and provided guidance on programs that seniors find beneficial.

These conversations aided greatly in the understanding of needs within the community, from housing to community needs and help to guide the selection of projects and afforded staff on both sides the opportunity to forge a relationship that help to build the community beyond the realm of CDBG.

City Staff will continue conversations with Ending Community Homelessness Coalition (ECHO), which serves as a Continuum of Care for the area, to obtain a better understanding of the services they provided the homeless population not only within Pflugerville but the region. Since entering the CDBG program the City has created contacts with ECHO and receives information monthly on the demographics of homeless in our region. Additionally, the City utilizes resources provided by Travis County for informational purposes as well as providing guidance to available services.

In order to meet the 41.4 percent criteria research found that the projects are generally limited to two block groups that can consistently meet the threshold for projects. The projects selected for consideration focused on needs for low to moderate income areas and greater benefit to the community overall by incorporating improved facilities for the senior population.

Selected projects are within LMI block groups, target community services serving children within LMI families or are focused on facilities providing a benefit to presumed low income clientele such as seniors.

The City utilizes data and services offered by ECHO and Travis County HHS/VS to aid in our knowledge of homeless issues as well as the needs of addressing homeless population and to reach that specific population in our area which has seen a 22 percent drop since 2011. The City is also a member of CAN (Community Action Network) a partnership of governmental, non-profit, private and faith-based organizations which leverage mutual resources to collectively improve social, health, educational and economic opportunities in our community. This partnership aids in the knowledge of not only the homeless populations but a variety of issues effecting the community and provides for opportunities to reach various populations and find services for the varying needs.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Due to limited resources Pflugerville does not anticipate undertaking any projects regarding homelessness within the time frame of the Consolidated Plan.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The City utilizes community services provided by Travis County for the remediation of lead based paint in Pflugerville's housing supply. Approximately 226 homes within the City of Pflugerville were constructed during the time when lead based paint was accepted for use. The City will continue to utilize Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Services, which receives funds through State grants and the Travis County General Fund to provide limited lead based paint remediation on houses built before 1978 where small holes in the wall or similar acts could cause additional lead exposure.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

Approximately 10% of Pflugerville residents live in poverty (ACS 2013 5 year estimate). Female headed households with children are particularly affected by poverty. The City's anti-poverty strategy is based on attracting a range of businesses and providing workforce development and a mix of uses throughout

the community that are supportive of each other reducing or eliminating the need to find housing, employment or services outside of the community.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

Effective implementation of the Consolidated Plan involves a variety of agencies. Coordination and collaboration within the City of Pflugerville and between agencies helps to ensure that the needs in the community are addressed. The key departments and agencies that are involved in the implementation of the Plan are described below.

Public sector

City of Pflugerville, Planning Department

The Planning Department is responsible for the administration of the City's programs funded by CDBG money. This office has primary responsibility for managing and implementing the City's Consolidated Plan programs and related documents.

Other City departments are also involved in providing services, include the Engineering Department, Parks and Recreation Department and the Public Works Department.

City of Pflugerville, Finance Department

The City Finance Department manages the CDBG procurement processes for commodities, professional services and construction. Expertise in the area of federal standards has been created within the department. The department submits all financial reports, including the SF-425.

Travis County Health & Human Services and Veterans Services Department (TCHHS/VS)

TCHHS/VS offers a variety of services to Pflugerville and Travis County residents including:

- Utility, Rent and Mortgage Assistance
- Family Assistance
- Children's Services
- Senior Services
- Public Health Services
- Emergency Services

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City is committed to continuing its participation and coordination with federal, state, county and

local agencies as well as with the private and non-profit sector, to serve the needs of target income individuals and families in the community. The City will continue to work with the area service providers as well as the building industry to address housing and community needs.

Discussion:

2nd Amended 2015 Action Plan - The city will be participating in a regional effort through an interlocal with the cities of Austin and Round Rock, Travis County and various public housing authorities to look at the effects of fair housing within our region.
